DOGS IN DESPERATE NEED WHEN HURRICANES THREATEN




Storms effect the lives of shelter dogs more then folks would know. When a hurricane threatens the Gulf most shelters are forced to put down whatever dogs they have, those that rescue have not pulled. If they don't, there will be no room for dogs that are running the streets after a hurricane in. N.A.B.S. has experienced this twice in the last 2 months of getting calls from a few shelters begging our help in getting dogs out so they will not have to put them down. Of course we jumped in to try and help. As Dolly was threatening the coast of Texas we received a call from the Angleton shelter with a plea to help get dogs out or they would have to be put down at the end of the day. One of those dogs was a sweet girl named Ellie Mae, that had been at that shelter for more then a year. She was such a wonderful dog and they had become so attached to her they just could never bring themselves to put her down. Much to their relief we pulled their last three dogs. Ellie Mae and a little boy now known as Frankie along with a yellow lab that they needed transported to another shelter, which then emptied their shelter. Ellie and Frankie now reside with Pam until they go to their forever homes. Next Gustav appeared The Brazoria County shelter sent out a plea for rescues to help. Their shelter was full and time was up for most of them. Pam and Lorry headed there to see what they could take. Well shortly after arriving and looking over what they had, they were going to get 3 littermates that needed out. When they went back to the other side of the building another control officer was standing in front of the kennels with a stack of papers in her hand and a bottle of blue fluid that was referred to as the juice. We didn't need to ask what it was, we knew too well. They inquired as to which dogs she had in that stack of paper's. Recognizing them as the dogs they just saw on the other side of the building they immediately told them they would take them also. They left the shelter that day with 9 dogs stuffed into Pam's car. There was no room for any more .. Four of the dogs were large unneutered males that were taken to stay in the pens at the land until their appointment on the 18th to be neutered. Four others went home with Pam and a small puppy went to be fostered by Lorry. May we all pray no more storms will threaten Texas this year.!!!

BETTER DOG PHOTOS FROM THE DOG BIBLE



Getting a good picture of a dog can seem to be nearly impossible. Here are some general tips to help you capture the true personality of your dog in photos

- Groom: Give your dog a bath and a nice brushing the day before you plan to take a picture. Then during the photo session, have brushes for grooming and towels for wiping runny eyes and drool on hand.
- Plan: Know the types of photos you want before you start taking them. Think about what the photos will be used for. What poses and backgrounds do you want? Consider how to reflect your dog's personality or working heritage in the photo. If you're photographing outdoors make sure the site is secure and away from traffic. Look for distractions and clutter in the background that could ruin the photo.
- Get help: Ask someone your dog knows to help so you can focus on working the camera. This person can reposition your dog, hold him on leash until you're ready to take the photo, and get his attention with treats, toys, noisemakers, or balls.
- Patience: Be patient and use positive reinforcement while taking pictures. Plan on using a lot of film to get some good shots. Now is not the time for discipline or losing your temper. Take breaks when needed. Have fun and make it fun for your dog.
- Get on your dog's level: Sit or crouch down and shoot photos slightly above or below the dog's eye level. Try different angles such as a three-quarter view of the body, full, face, and profile shots. Experiment.
